Target Group: 25 Students (Lower Kindergarten, Upper Kindergarten, Grade 1)

Introduction:

On March 17, 2025, Stand Up 4 Elephants (SU4E) conducted an educational outreach session aimed at fostering early awareness and appreciation for elephants and other animals among young learners. The session was designed to be age-appropriate, interactive, and engaging, in alignment with SU4E's commitment to wildlife conservation education.

Program Objectives:

- 1. To introduce young learners to elephants and their conservation in a fun and interactive way.
- 2. To encourage empathy and curiosity about wildlife through raising awareness of the diets or food of different animals.
- 3. To integrate creative expression with environmental education.

Activities Conducted:

1. Animal-Diet Matching Activity:

Students participated in a guided matching exercise where they paired various animals with their corresponding diets. This activity provided foundational knowledge on animal behavior and dietary needs.

2. Elephant Mask Painting Workshop:

Each child received a cardboard cutout of an elephant mask. With the help of paints and guidance from the facilitators, the students decorated their masks independently, allowing them to express their creativity while reinforcing their learning about elephants through fun and hands-on involvement.

Tools and materials used:

- 1. Printed animal and food matching cards
- 2. Instructional materials and visual aids (posters, flashcards)
- 3. Cardboard elephant mask cutouts
- 4. Paints and paintbrushes

Outcomes:

The session successfully engaged all participants, with children demonstrating enthusiasm and attentiveness throughout. The combination of educational content and creative expression helped reinforce key messages in a memorable and age-appropriate way.

Conclusion:

The Elephant Educational Program by SU4E effectively met its objectives and was positively received by both students and educators. Early education initiatives such as this are essential to nurturing responsible attitudes toward wildlife and conservation from a young age.
